We had been experiencing some ASB from a vehicle in the Tytherley area involved in suspected poaching. Tristan and I were able to track down the owner and give suitable words of advice and actions that would be taken should they return to the area.

A warrant was executed by PC James and the team in early March. The suspect was arrested, a search of the premises was conducted and the investigation is currently on-going.

Tristan recovered a stolen Defender which was also seized for forensic evidence as well as a motorbike which had been dumped and left in a hedge without number plates.

Marie attended a careers day along with Zaliha who is the positive action co-ordinator with Hampshire Constabulary. Students from several secondary schools attended and spoke to us and other employers and colleges about working for us in the future. Neighbourhood Priorities

Theft from sheds and outbuildings: Please remain vigilant of items stored within your property. Pushbikes and power tools are often the items of choice but anything they can take easily, that is of value, will tempt them. Please lock, padlock and/or alarm your outbuildings and security mark items wherever possible, so if or when they are found we can return them to their rightful owners.

Bike register is a national database whereby you can add your frame & any serial numbers as well as make, model, colour and photos so if your bike gets lost or stolen there is a greater chance of getting it back. It is free to log your bike and if you would like security stickers there is a small charge. Fraud and scams: Cold Calls via your home phone often cause a lot of alarm and distress for those who are vulnerable. Calls by scammers claiming to be from your bank, HMRC, DVLA, NHS, etc are now more commonplace. We wanted to give you some advice and warning about these type of calls. 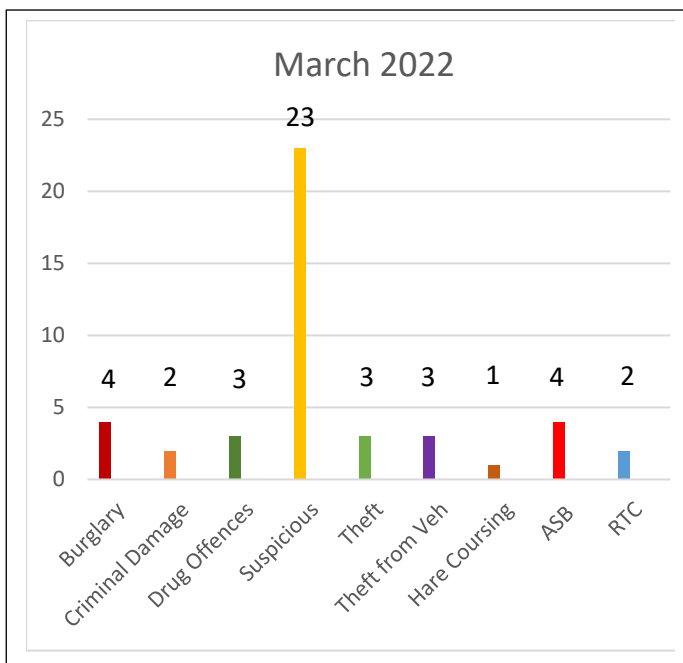

Interview with PC James Batt...

What made you join the Police? I joined Hampshire Constabulary in 2016 as a PCSO at 19 years old. I've always had a passion for wanting to help people, and knew that the Police was the career path I wanted to take in life.

What has been the biggest change? Probably the biggest change in each Police Force. Every Police Force works very differently, and has their own policing priorities.

What has been your best success? I was called to a female in distress on a railway bridge. I was the first officer on scene, and had to make difficult decisions about how to manage the ever changing risk that presented itself. The female was hanging off the wrong side of the bridge, threatening to jump. After about 30 minutes, of trying to engage with the female, I was able to talk her down from the bridge. The female later told me, had I not got to her when I did, she was certainly going to jump.

What advice would you give yourself if you could go back in time to when you started? To get life experience before joining. The job is a vocation and shift work is not for everyone. This will give you the skills and experience when it comes to handling the wide variety of the community and calls we deal with and give you the resilience required to do your job well.

THEFT OF FUEL: With the price of fuel rising to all new highs please remain ever vigilant. [Rural crime prevention | Hampshire Constabulary](#)

Locks: A good thief will come equipped with a limited range of tools to attack your tank so it's worth spending a little more on good quality locks. Close shackle padlocks are the best as they offer most resistance to the most popular of burglar tools - the bolt cropper! Due to their design, close shackle padlocks have very little of the metal hoop (shackle) exposed and bolt croppers cannot get a good grip. Remember that buying a padlock is like buying a car the more you pay the better the quality you get and the longer it will last.

Monitors: Remote electronic oil level gauges are now available which will set off an audible alarm if the oil level in the tank suddenly drops or falls below a quarter full. These gauges can be located in the kitchen or perhaps a utility room to warn of any potential problem. There are two or three different versions on the market at the moment and cost between £70 and £200.

Security lighting: Security lights can have a very positive effect and make any property a much harder target for the thief. Its not always necessary to floodlight the area with high power beams, as a more subtle level of lighting may be all that is needed. Low energy "dusk til' dawn lights positioned close to the tank should, in most cases, provide sufficient light to illuminate any suspicious activity. This type of light can be both effective and inexpensive. High powered lights can be used but care should be taken not to cause any nuisance to neighbours or road users.

Defensive Planting: This is nature's way of helping to reduce crime. Thieves will not wish to force their way through or over a prickly hedge. The smallest trace of blood or shred of ripped clothing could help the police identify the offender. Prickly shrubs and bushes can, if planted around your tank, provide an effective and decorative thief-proof barrier.

Fencing: Fences and walls can also make life difficult for the thief. A wooden or metal fence, trellis or wall can give significant protection to the tank but it must be remembered that the oil tanker driver will need access to fill the tank. A metal grill or cage with a lockable access point across the top of this wall or fence can further improve security.

Theft of Catalytic Converters: There are several options and companies who offer kits such as those below. Hilliers Gardens have seen a sharp rise of thefts recently.

Catalytic Converter Theft has been in the news recently, the market price of precious metals such as rhodium, platinum and palladium that are used in catalytic converters has risen sharply recently and looks set to continue. This has resulted in a **64% increase** in the theft of catalytic converters during 2020.

Cars that are most often targeted are hybrid vehicles, as these vehicles have two power sources, so the catalytic converter is used less frequently. The metals are less likely to corrode meaning the converters are in a better condition, so they are worth more and therefore more attractive to thieves.

On diesel cars, the diesel oxidation catalyst is often integrated with the Diesel Particulate Filter (DPF) and there is evidence that these are being stolen for their scrap value too.

Hybrid cars, vans and Sports Utility vehicles ('SUV's') are particularly at risk, as the ride height makes access to the exhaust system beneath them easier. However, thieves can always jack up a car with a small trolley jack and quickly remove catalytic converters from any vehicle, even in the daytime. Honda's and Toyota appear to be the choice of vehicle in this area but this is not always the case.

The offenders also use high-vis clothing or disguise themselves as motor professionals during the daytime making it easier for catalytic converter theft.
